WHAT WE DO

The Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society provides awards and scholarships to students to encourage and facilitate their pursuit of post-secondary education. The Society was created in 2004 following the establishment of a permanent endowment by the Province of British Columbia. The Society is named after philanthropist Irving K. Barber, who was well known for his long-standing support of public education. Since its inception, the Society has granted over \$16 Million in scholarships and awards to hundreds of students across the province. The Society's programs are administered by the Victoria Foundation.

HOW WE DO IT

The Society provides financial awards and scholarships through five separate programs to students attending post secondary institutions throughout B.C. and internationally. These programs help Aboriginal students access post-secondary education, aid students transferring between institutions to complete degrees, and facilitate studies abroad.

Aboriginal Student Award

The BC Aboriginal Student Award improves access to post-secondary education for Aboriginal students by reducing financial barriers. Renewable Awards of \$1,000 - \$2,000 are available for Aboriginal students pursuing trades training, certificates, diplomas, or undergraduate degrees.

Aboriginal Teacher Education Award

This award program, launched in February 2012, supports Aboriginal students enrolled in a teacher education program at a public post-secondary institution in British Columbia. Awards are \$5,000 annually.

Aboriginal Master & Doctoral Award

As a result of a special grant from the Government of British Columbia, the Society has been able to offer awards of \$5,000 each to Aboriginal students pursuing masters and doctoral-level studies. These annually renewable awards encourage completion of post-secondary education at the higher levels and recognize the often high costs associated with obtaining these degrees.

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarship

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarships are awarded to undergraduate students who have completed one or two years of study at a public post-secondary institution and are transferring to another degree granting institution in B.C. to complete their degrees. Scholarships of \$5,000 each are awarded annually from this program.

International Scholarships

The Society's international scholarship programs are for study outside of North America and are available to students enrolled at a B.C. public post-secondary institution. Scholarships of between \$1,000 and \$10,000 are awarded each year to students who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement and community involvement.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR Rajiv Gandhi





A Simple Premise

For the better part of thirteen years, the Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society (IKBBC) has operated on a simple premise – to assist students pursuing post-secondary education. In that time, and from a pool of carefully managed funds endowed by the Province of British Columbia, IKBBC has awarded more than \$16 million dollars to more than 5500 students, many residing in indigenous or remote communities where opportunities for advancement have been historically limited.

Programs are designed to encourage students to broaden their horizons and to support the entry of women and indigenous students in fields of study

where, in the past, they have been woefully under-represented. Included in this are awards for First Nations, Metis, and Inuit people seeking higher education, grants encouraging students to study abroad, a scholarship for students transferring between institutions in British Columbia, and a newly announced Women in Technology Scholarship, a \$10,000 prize for students of exceptionally high caliber seeking degrees in computer science, engineering, and math. Like its namesake, everybody at IKBBC strongly believes that these programs are crucial to improving the quality of life in our province and essential to improving the status of women and continuing reconciliation with indigenous communities.

Managing what is now a sixty-five million dollar plus capital fund and administering several distinct scholarship and award programs is a monumental undertaking. Continued success would not be possible without the dedication and effort of the Victoria Foundation and, most notably, volunteers from every corner of the Province who freely give their time to evaluate scholarship and grant applications.

For each of the Directors of the IKBBC, I extend our gratitude to every one of these individuals. You are making a vital contribution to the success of our students, and to the future prosperity of communities, big and small, in British Columbia.
