WHAT WE DO

The Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society provides awards and scholarships to students to encourage and facilitate their pursuit of post-secondary education. The Society was created in 2004 following the establishment of a permanent endowment by the Province of British Columbia. The Society is named after philanthropist Irving K. Barber, who was well known for his long-standing support of public education. Since its inception, the Society has granted over \$19 Million in scholarships and awards to hundreds of students across the province. The Society's programs are administered by the Victoria Foundation.

HOW WE DO IT

The Society provides financial awards and scholarships through six separate programs to students attending public post-secondary institutions throughout B.C. and internationally.

Indigenous Student Award

The BC Indigenous Student Award improves access to post-secondary education for Indigenous students by reducing financial barriers. Renewable awards of \$1,000 - \$2,500 are available for Indigenous students pursuing trades training, certificates, diplomas, or undergraduate degrees.

Indigenous Teacher Education Award

This award program supports Indigenous students enrolled in a teacher education program at a public post-secondary institution in BC. Awards of \$5,000 each are granted for up to four years.

Indigenous Master & Doctoral Award

As a result of a special grant from the Province of British Columbia, the Society has been able to offer awards of \$5,000 each to Indigenous students pursuing masters and doctoral-level studies.

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarship

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarships are awarded to undergraduate students who have completed one or two years of study at a post-secondary institution and are transferring to another degree granting institution in B.C. to complete their degrees. Scholarships of \$5,000 each are awarded annually from this program.

International Scholarships

The Society's international scholarship programs are for study outside of North America and are available to students enrolled at a B.C. public post-secondary institution. Scholarships of between \$1,000 and \$10,000 are awarded each year to students who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement and community involvement.

Women in Technology Scholarships

In 2018, the Province of British Columbia provided funds to the Society for the creation of a Scholarship to recognize women excelling at the study of Engineering, Mathematics or Computer/Data Science. Ten Scholarships of \$10,000 each are awarded annually. At least one is reserved for a woman of Indigenous ancestry.

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For almost fifteen years the Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society (IKBBC) has managed funds endowed by the Province of British Columbia with the singular goal of creating opportunities for the students of British Columbia, many in communities where that opportunity is historically, geographically, or economically limited.

IKBBC administered programs support students seeking to broaden their horizons and encourage the continuing contribution of women and Indigenous students. Included in these programs are awards for First Nations, Métis, and Inuit people in search of higher education, grants encouraging students to study outside North America, a scholarship for students transferring between institutions in British Columbia, and scholarships recognizing exceptional students, including women studying in the fields of computer science, engineering, and math.

In 2018, IKBBC distributed a total of \$3.2 Million to over 1,000 students, each of them meeting rigorous standards of educational and personal achievement.

It is no simple task, and the continued success of the IKBBC would not be possible without the dedication and effort of our eleven member Board of Directors, our partners at the Victoria Foundation and, most notably, volunteers from communities across the province who freely give their time to promote, and to evaluate applications for, the scholarships, and awards granted each year.

On behalf of the current Board, I convey our continuing gratitude to each of you who, believe that these programs are essential to improving the quality of life in our province and necessary to improving the status of women and the Indigenous peoples of British Columbia. I also wish to convey a personal thank you to outgoing Board members Barbara Crocker, for her stewardship of the Women in Technology Scholarship and the Transfer Program, and Pauline Waterfall, O.B.C., for her invaluable contribution, unique perspective, and sage advice.

This is my final year as Chair of IKBBC. My time on the Board has been both educational and humbling, and I am honoured to have been able to contribute, in some small way, to the future of our Province.
