WHAT WE DO

The Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society provides awards and scholarships to students to encourage and facilitate their pursuit of post-secondary education. The Society was created in 2004 following the establishment of a permanent endowment by the Province of British Columbia. The Society is named after philanthropist Irving K. Barber, who was well known for his long-standing support of public education. Since its inception, the Society has granted over \$23 Million in scholarships and awards to hundreds of students across the province. The Society's programs are administered by the Victoria Foundation.

HOW WE DO IT

The Society provides financial awards and scholarships through six separate programs to students attending public post-secondary institutions throughout B.C. and internationally.

Indigenous Student Award

The BC Indigenous Student Award improves access to post-secondary education for Indigenous students by reducing financial barriers. Renewable awards of \$1,000 - \$2,500 are available for Indigenous students pursuing trades training, certificates, diplomas, or undergraduate degrees.

Indigenous Teacher Education Award

This award program supports Indigenous students enrolled in a teacher education progr.am at a public post-secondary institution in B.C. Awards of \$5,000 each are granted for up to four years.

Indigenous Masters & Doctoral Award

As a result of a special grant from the Province of British Columbia, the Society has been able to offer awards of \$5,000 each to Indigenous students pursuing masters and doctoral-level studies.

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarship

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarships are awarded to undergraduate students who have completed one or two years of study at a post-secondary institution and are transferring to another degree granting institution in B.C. to complete their degrees. Scholarships of \$5,000 each are awarded annually from this program.

International Scholarships

The Society's international scholarship programs are for study outside of North America and are available to students enrolled at a B.C. public post-secondary institution. Scholarships of between \$1,000 and \$10,000 are awarded each year to students who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement and community involvement.

Women in Technology Scholarships

This scholarship recognizes women excelling at the study of Engineering, Mathematics or Computer/Data Science. Ten Scholarships of \$10,000 each are awarded annually. At least one is reserved for a woman of Indigenous ancestry.

The Irving K Barber Scholarship Society was established to encourage and assist students to pursue post-secondary education. To this end, since its inception, the Society has assisted thousands of BC students, with awards totalling in excess of \$23M.

Scholarship programs managed by the Society vary in scope from those that assist Indigenous students, to those for transferring students, those that allow for study and even experiential learning abroad, and those that focus on recognizing high level achievement in specific fields of study.

The number of Indigenous students applying for designated awards is growing year over year. With the assistance of the Indigenous community, we evolve award criteria to be continually more meaningful and relatable to students. Awards allow for a full range of academic credential from Certificate to Graduate studies.

Our Transfer Awards allow students to take the next step, to ladder their education, building one academic program upon another. Frequently, students move from more remote areas to complete their studies. This year, we have undertaken the planning of scholarships for another aspect of Transferring – transition from Adult Basic Education to post-secondary studies. We look forward to meeting the needs of this student sector in the near future.

Our International Awards are extremely popular, with applications routinely exceeding funds available. Students return from abroad having not only advanced their academic careers, but also reporting great personal growth.

Women in Technology Awards are now well established and sought out. They recognize exceptional women studying in Computer/Data Science, Math, and Engineering. Those reviewing applications report that students are working to solve modern day problems in their chosen fields. With a current roster of recipients engaging in the community, promoting the scholarships, we are meeting the goal that award winners serve as role models for the next generation of women interested in the Sciences.

Oversight and management of the detail of these many and varied scholarships would not be possible without strong teams. We are very appreciative of Victoria Foundation staff who ably manage our programs. Our Board Directors provide expert governance, including financial, for flow through and endowed funds in excess of \$69M. Dedicated volunteers from all over BC come together to evaluate scholarship and grant applications. Each and every person contributes to the success of our students. For this, I extend sincere gratitude.
