
BC Scholarship Society

2024 Annual Report



The BC Scholarship Society provides awards and scholarships to students to encourage and facilitate their pursuit of post secondary education. The Society was created in 2004 following the establishment of a permanent endowment by the Province of British Columbia. Since its inception, the Society has granted over \$39 Million in scholarships and awards to thousands of students across the province. The Society's programs are administered by the Victoria Foundation.

HOW WE DO IT

The Society provides financial awards and scholarships through five separate programs to students attending public post-secondary institutions throughout B.C. and internationally.

INDIGENOUS STUDENT AWARDS

The BC Indigenous Student Award improves access to post-secondary education for Indigenous students by reducing financial barriers. Renewable awards of \$3,000 to \$10,000 are available for Indigenous students pursuing trades training, certificates, diplomas, undergraduate and post graduate degrees.

IKE BARBER TRANSFER SCHOLARSHIPS

Ike Barber Transfer Scholarships, named in honour of educational philanthropist Irving K. Barber, are awarded to undergraduate students who have completed one or two years of study at a post-secondary institution and are transferring to another institution in B.C. to complete their studies. Scholarships are valued at \$5,000 each.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION TRANSITION AWARDS

This award program encourages students completing Adult Basic Education Programs to pursue full-time post-secondary study and training. Awards of \$5,000 are granted to help students make this challenging transition.

INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

The Society's international scholarship programs are for study outside of North America and are available to students enrolled at a B.C. public post-secondary institution. Scholarships of between \$2,000 and \$12,000 are awarded each year to students seeking to add an international perspective to their education

WOMEN IN TECHNOLOGY SCHOLARSHIPS

This Scholarship recognizes women excelling at the study of Engineering, Mathematics or Computer/Data Science. These scholarships are valued at \$10,000 each. At least one is reserved for a woman of Indigenous ancestry.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

We are proud to report that in 2024, the BC Scholarship Society awarded 913 scholarships and awards totaling \$3.27 million, bringing our total funding to students across British Columbia to nearly \$40 million since the Society's inception. While the total number and dollar value of awards granted this year were modestly lower than in 2023, this reflects normal year-to-year variation across programs. More importantly, the reach and impact of these awards remain strong.

The Indigenous Student Award Undergrad Program held steady, with 292 recipients receiving a combined \$876,000 in support, a slight increase in both funding and recipients from last year. Similarly, the Women in Technology Scholarship program awarded 14 scholarships, up from 12 in 2023, reflecting our ongoing commitment to equity in high-demand STEM fields.

The Transfer Scholarship and Adult Basic Education Transition Award programs together supported 148 students in 2024. While this represents a slight decrease from 2023, the impact remains significant, especially for students like Leona DeOliveira, whose Transition Award is helping her train for a new career in nursing after returning to school as an adult learner. The International Scholarship program saw a reduction in awards granted this year, though it remains our largest program by volume and total funding. These scholarships continue to provide transformative global learning opportunities for students attending public post secondary institutions in B.C.

The Society also provided 61 awards through our Indigenous Masters/Doctoral and Indigenous Teacher Education programs, ensuring that Indigenous learners at advanced levels of study are supported in their academic journeys. One such recipient is Connor Lewis, who is beginning his law studies in the Joint Degree in Common Law and Indigenous Legal Orders at the University of Victoria, an inspiring continuation of his commitment to community, land, and justice. In early 2024, our Board completed a strategic planning process to guide our work in the coming years. With a dedicated and diverse Board—including members-at-large and provincial appointees with expertise in post secondary education—we are focused on sustaining our programs, adapting to emerging student needs, and maximizing the long-term impact of our funding.

We're also pleased to report that the value of our investment funds has remained strong, continuing the recovery begun in 2023. This positions us well to maintain and potentially grow our endowment-supported programs over time.

As always, the success of our programs is made possible through the steadfast support of the Ministry of Post-Secondary Education and Future Skills, the administrative leadership of the Victoria Foundation, and the dedication of our volunteer Board. Most of all, we are inspired by the resilience, ambition, and success of the students we support. We look forward to continuing this important work in 2025.
